Supplies

- ➤ Peat Moss: Easy to find in any big box store or garden center. If the bales are compressed (hard as a rock) then you'll need to thoroughly fluff it. It's a hard job and needs to be done well. Try to find bales that are more loosely compressed.
- ➤ Coarse Vermiculite: SFG Forum members compiled this list, so it may not be 100% accurate. Call the store first to confirm they have COARSE vermiculite in 2 or 3 cubic foot bags.

- ➤ Blended Compost: Look for a local source of compost. This site may be helpful: <u>www.findacomposter.com</u>
- ➤ Bagged Compost: Compost is usually the castoff of a single manufacturing process sugar beets, the lumber industry, cotton hulls, composted manure, lobster or crab shells, corn, etc. Choose at least 5 different types. There are some premium brands that have a mix of 2 or 3 things. BTW, Mushroom compost is not made from mushrooms it is what the mushrooms were grown in. (If using bagged compost, read the ingredients list. If one of the first 3 ingredients listed is "peat moss" there isn't likely much actual compost in it.)
- > Coco Coir: Several places sell it. Rinse very well as it may have a lot of sodium (salt) in it.
